Meeting the Needs of Individual Pupils

Sarratt is a fully inclusive school that caters for the individual needs of pupils. Pupils' achievements in all areas are recognised and celebrated.

The general curriculum is broad and balanced providing continuity and progression throughout.

Childrens' different learning styles are accommodated within the organisation of the class and planned activities.

Up-to-date methods and technology are used e.g. Interactive Whiteboards and iPads.

Our assessment protocols ensure that pupil progress is measured and tracked according to age related criteria. As pupils move through the school, from Reception to Year 6, continuity is provided through our tracking system.

Teachers implement strategies for any pupils not making expected progress including Individual Learning Plans and regular review meetings with parents.

Pupils with notable ability in particular areas are catered for with activities and opportunities to extend their skills and understanding.

On Your First Day

What time do I need to arrive?

8.40am - 8.50am

Which entrance do I come to?

Come to the main office where we will greet you and your child and take your child to meet the class teacher.

Where do I park?

Parking is available in The Cricketers car park. A gate leads into the school grounds.

Who do I see?

Please ask for Mrs Chrysanthou when you arrive.

What time do I need to collect?

3.15pm

Morning Start and Afternoon Finish

Getting off to a prompt start is important so parents must ensure that children arrive at school on time and that they are collected promptly after school. This will help with making the children feel secure. Parents must advise the school office if they are delayed in the morning or afternoon and if alternative collection arrangements have been made.

School Opening and Closing Times

The school gates open at **8.40am** and as soon as the children arrive they go directly into their classrooms. Teachers, who will already be in their respective classrooms, will have prepared activities for the children. This “rolling start” is very successful in settling our children straight into learning.

All children must be in their classrooms by **8.50am** after which they will be recorded as late. If you arrive after this time, please come to the main office to register your child.

For the safety of the children, the school gates will be locked at 9.00am. After this time any parents visiting the school must enter through the main entrance.

School finishes at **3.15pm** as stated. Parents must be on time to collect their child as stated either at the end of school or, if attending clubs, at the published finish time.



Absence

At Sarratt Church of England School we want the whole school community (Staff, Governors, Parents and Children) to be committed to high standards of attendance and punctuality. Good attendance helps the children to maximise their learning.

Our Attendance Policy is published on our website.

No leave of absence will be granted for family holidays.

The school operates a 1st Day Response Policy. This means that if we are not notified by 9.30am that a child will not be in school that day we will contact their parent/carer.

Notification must be given if your child needs to leave school during the school day. Parents/carers must provide a specific reason for all absences of the child from school. Parents/carers may be asked to provide evidence for the absence i.e. a doctor's note, medical appointment letter, etc. Being "ill" is not sufficient.

Please ensure that you notify the school if your child has an infectious disease. Please allow a full 48 hours to pass after instances of vomiting/diarrhoea before returning your child to school.

Registers are monitored on a regular basis by our Attendance Improvement Officer to look at patterns of absence, identify individual or group absences, attendance of siblings, etc. A meeting with parents/carers may be requested if attendance is not satisfactory.



Admissions

Sarratt Church of England School is a one-form entry primary school for children aged 4 to 11 years. The standard admission number is 26 pupils per year group. Children attend school on a full-time basis from the beginning of the academic year in which they turn five. The Admissions Team at Herts County Council manages the School's Admissions Policy.

Admission to Reception

During the academic year in which a child turns four, parents are invited to apply for a primary school place via the Herts County Council online application system, which normally opens in mid-November and closes in mid-January of each year. All applications are dealt with by Hertfordshire County Council, using the admissions criteria detailed on their website.

School Meals and Food Policy

Freshly cooked lunches are available each day and you will be kept informed of meal prices. Charges are payable half-terminally in advance and payment can be made via the school gateway link on the school website. Children may bring packed lunches if they prefer. Please support our Healthy Eating Policy which includes non-fizzy drinks in pre-packed cartons or in a plastic flask. Children are not allowed to bring sweets to school. We have a no nut policy in school, as some children are so highly allergic to nuts that they risk a life-threatening reaction if they are in too close a proximity to nuts.

Health and Safety

Making sure our pupils are Healthy, Safe and Well

Pupils and staff enjoy very positive relationships. The whole school is committed to our children's safety and child protection procedures are always in place.

Our Behaviour Policy is highly effective in practice and based on the positive reinforcement of our values.

PSHE (Physical, Social and Health Education) is overtly taught in every class weekly. Assemblies are supported by the national scheme, SEAL, which ensures that **Social and Emotional Aspects of Learning** are regularly taught at a whole school level, in addition to the Schools' Golden Rules and lunchtime code.

The Pupil Council meets regularly and is a conduit to all classes from Year 2 upwards.

Keeping a healthy body is positively taught in Science and P.E. Pupils also learn about the dangers of an unhealthy lifestyle at an age appropriate level. Many of our clubs are exercise based. The Health and Welfare Co-ordinator promotes co-operative games and the Sunrise and Sunset Club embraces a healthy lifestyle ethos. (Please refer to the appendix for more information about this club).

We have a Healthy Snack Policy for breaktime and Key Stage 1 pupils benefit from the government's fresh fruit initiative. Our cook provides healthy school lunches.

Our Travel Plan application was successful and has funded a safer entrance to the school site to support the walk to school initiative.

The Welfare of your Child

Teaching staff are aware of each individual child in their care and are always vigilant for any problems that might arise, be they medical or emotional.

All our staff hold valid first aid certification and have regular safeguarding training.

When a child is taken ill, we contact the parents/carers as soon as possible. It is imperative that you provide a daytime contact telephone number. In the case of a more serious injury, should we be unable to contact the parent/carer, a member of staff will accompany the child to hospital.

Medicines and Allergies

If your child has been prescribed medication that needs to be taken during school time, please speak with the school office and complete a “MED1 form” which is available on the web site under the Parents tab or from the school office. The medicine must be clearly named and labelled with written instructions regarding dosage.

In school we treat grazes and small cuts with sterile wipes and plasters as necessary. We use sterile antiseptic wipes, gauze, plasters, sterile water (for eyes), aloe vera and sports gels as detailed in our Health and Safety Policy. Parents/carers do have the option of asking the school not to administer any of these items on their children.

Parents must inform the school office of any pupil allergies, so that all staff are aware of the concern and can respond appropriately. Parents are required to provide medication such as EPIPENS, which will be stored centrally and available for emergency use.

Behaviour

Discipline within the school reflects the high expectations placed upon the children. Parental backing and support is high and children’s behaviour reflects this. Our aim is to develop self-discipline in our pupils and we do this through discussion and by positive example.

Children are encouraged to discuss and make their own rules for classroom behaviour. The school has a Positive Behaviour Scheme in place called “The Sarratt Way”. There are many ways in which we reinforce positive behaviour including celebration assemblies held every Friday at 9.00am. Pupils who have attained excellence in some aspect of their development or learning have their names entered into the Gold Book. This is read out to the school and an audience of selected parents.

Any occurrence of misbehaviour is dealt with, in the first instance, by the supervising adult. If the incident is repeated, various sanctions are used (e.g. missing playtime). For serious incidents, the parents will be asked to come to the school to discuss the situation. The school does not tolerate racism, bullying or prejudice based behaviours of any kind.

A copy of the school’s Positive Behaviour Policy is published on the school website under the Statutory Information tab or the school office.

Homework

All children take a reading book home every day to share with parents/carers. As children progress through the school, homework is given regularly. This includes spellings, research, writing, maths and science work. Class teachers operate individual homework record books to aid children's memories and keep parents informed. Parents are encouraged to support their children with homework; however they should ensure that the homework reflects the child's level of ability so that teachers can gauge their personal progress accurately.

Concerns and Complaints

If parents feel that they have a concern or a complaint about the school they should first discuss it with the class teacher. If they are still concerned they should contact the Headteacher to discuss the matter. If the problem cannot be satisfactorily resolved at this stage, the Headteacher will write to the parents explaining the position and provide the contact details of the Governing Body. Members of the Governing Body will meet with the parents to hear the complaint and reach a final verdict advising the parent/carer in writing. The Complaints Policy is published on the school website under the Parent tab or you can obtain a copy from the school office.

School Uniform

We believe that the wearing of uniform creates a sense of community identity. It also helps the children focus on their education as soon as they dress for school each day. Our uniform has been chosen for its ease of availability in general high street stores. Items of clothing that are particular to the school (sweatshirts, fleeces, ties etc.) can be ordered from the school supplier:

It is vital that each item of clothing is clearly and permanently labelled with the child's name and that this is regularly checked at home.

Long hair should be tied back neatly with hairbands (in school colours only). Extreme hairstyles are discouraged.

Boys

- Green sweatshirt/V-neck pullover, green fleece
- Grey/white polo shirt/shirt and tie*
- Grey trousers/shorts
- Grey/black socks
- Dark shoes/sandals
- A seasonally suitable coat

* Boys are to wear shirts and ties in Years 5 and 6 and on special occasions the younger boys may also be asked to wear them.

Girls

- Green sweatshirt or fleece/green cardigan
- Grey/white polo shirt or blouse and tie*
- Green/grey skirt or tunic
- Grey trousers (as the boys)
- Green and white dress (summer)
- White socks
- Green/grey/black tights
- Dark shoes/sandals (no heels)
- A seasonally suitable coat

* Girls are to wear blouses and ties in Years 5 and 6 and on special occasions the younger girls may also be asked to wear them

All pupils – PE/Games

- Plimsolls or training shoes or football boots when appropriate
- White/black/green shorts (not cycle shorts)
- Plain white T-shirt or white school T-shirts
- Green and white football socks and shin pads (if appropriate)
- Black tracksuit for the colder months
- Drawstring PE bag

Art and Craft Overalls

All children need a named overall – preferably an old adult shirt with elastic at the cuffs and neck and a hook to hang it up with.

Hairstyles, Jewellery and Decoration

With the exception of “simple” wrist watches, jewellery should not be worn in school. Only circular stud earrings (without a stone) are permitted for children with pierced ears. As these must be removed or covered with tape for PE, pupils should bring in a small box/wallet for their safekeeping or tape.

Make-up and nail varnish are not permitted.

Long hair must be worn tied back from the face and extreme hairstyles are not permitted.

Equipment

The school provides basic writing equipment but many children like to have their own coloured pencils, pocket dictionary and geometry equipment as they move into Key Stage 2. Please ensure these items are fully named.

Books

Your child will regularly bring books home. Please encourage them to respect and take care of books, including bringing them to and from school in a bag. Specially designed school bags are available from the school office.

Lost Property

All named property is returned as soon as possible to the owner. Unnamed property is kept in the lost property boxes outside the Year 3 classroom. Parents are welcome to check for lost items. Unnamed property will be destroyed at the end of term.

Activities Available to Pupils

Sports matches are played against other schools including Football, Tag Rugby and Netball.

Curricular activities include:

- Termly educational visits to museums, art galleries and short local trips
- Year 6 residential trip for outdoor adventure activities (PGL in Lincolnshire)
- Cycling skills - Year 4 (level 1) and Year 5 (level 2)
- Visitors to school include Artist in Residence, Dance Workshops and Musical Ensembles and Theatre Groups

National Events: e.g. Book Weeks

Charity Events: (Chosen by the Children) Comic Relief, NSPCC Fundraising

Seasonal Celebrations include:

- Harvest Celebration in conjunction with the Holy Cross congregation
- FS/KS1 Nativity and KS2 Carol Concert in December (together these involve all pupils)
- Summer Production
- Leavers Service

Peripatetic Music Lessons include:

- Guitar, Strings, Woodwind, Piano and Drums
- 20/30 minute lessons are delivered by specialist music teachers
- To book music lessons for your child, please contact the school office as soon as possible as places are offered on a first come, first served basis.

School Clubs:

The school offers a range of extracurricular clubs which are held before, during and after normal school hours. Details of the clubs currently available are published on the school website.

Please note that clubs are popular so it is important to submit the appropriate application form as soon as possible, as places are offered on a first come, first served basis.

Expectations for behaviour at school clubs are the same as in school lessons. If a child is not behaving appropriately the coach/tutor will contact the parents.

If your child is unable to attend a club for any reason, you must inform the coach directly or leave a message with the school office.



Charging Policy

School trips and visits are an important part of the schools provision and benefit the children's learning. Each trip is costed and the total divided by the number of children in the group. Parents are requested to make a voluntary contribution towards the cost of the trip. If insufficient contributions are received on time, the school may have to cancel the event.

Parents may be asked to contribute towards the costs of materials used at the school to make items that are subsequently taken home by the children e.g. cooking, pottery or textiles.

The School Site and Facilities

The Foundation Unit

This is a demountable building that has secure grounds slightly separate from the main school providing accommodation for the youngest children. Our Reception class occupies one classroom whilst Sarratt Ducklings Pre-School occupies the other. The Reception children are fully integrated into the school timetable enjoying some playtimes, assemblies and other events with other school pupils.

The Main School Building

We have six individual classrooms. The classrooms are laid out in year groups with Years 1 and 2, 3 and 4, and, 5 and 6 located next to each other. The main building also houses the central hall used for assemblies, plays and as a dining room. The kitchen is located next to the hall with hatchways for serving food. The administration and staff areas are located next to and around the main entrance, with the school office located immediately inside the main entrance. The school library is located next to the school office.

Outside Facilities

The school has excellent outdoor facilities and areas enabling the children to make good use of the outdoors.

We have two playgrounds accessible to all of our children, however, ball games are only permitted in one to allow quieter free play in the other. Seating areas with tables are provided for use during playtime.

A large climbing frame provides an adventure area for the children. Its use is timetabled and for safety reasons, only used during the school day with full-time supervision by staff. Children are not allowed to use the climbing frame outside of school hours.

There is a garden area under the flowering cherry tree which is popular for quiet activities in the warmer months. We also have a vegetable garden and children have the opportunity to join the Gardening Club.

There is a grassed sports field used for all sports throughout the year. When it is dry children are also allowed to use it for play.

The Village pond area provides space to study wildlife and the perimeters of the school grounds are mostly lined with natural hedging for further study.

Emergency Closure Procedures

If for any reason the school needs to close e.g. due to heavy snowfall, parents/carers will be advised as soon as possible in the following ways:

Community Links

The Vicar takes the fortnightly Wednesday assembly and through our links with the Church, harvest goods are distributed to elderly neighbours.

Members of the community value the links with the school and are frequent visitors.

We have an excellent relationship with Sarratt Ducklings Pre-School who are located in one of the classrooms in the Foundation Unit. Staff from Ducklings and our Reception class are working increasingly closely for the benefit of the children in Early Years.

Working with Parents

The school enjoys very good working relationships with parents. All staff have an open door policy enabling parents to discuss their concerns and ideas. As well as these informal meetings we also seek parents' views through annual questionnaires. We keep in touch with regular newsletters available on the website, via email or paper copy.

Parents receive a detailed annual report on their child's progress at the end of the summer term. In addition, we have two consultation meetings per year as well as curriculum information sessions and a secondary transfer meeting for Year 6 parents. Meetings are held with parents of children with Special Educational Needs. We also hold regular whole school Parent Information Evenings addressing curriculum areas.

Parents are invited to join us for sharing events and school performances.

Sarratt Parents Association

The school benefits from a very active and effective Sarratt Parents' Association (SPA) which raises funds for the school and supports the staff in many practical ways. This committee of volunteer parents meets throughout the year to arrange events.

The money raised during the year is used to support the development of the school and enhance the life of the pupils. In recent years, the SPA has purchased books for the Home-School reading scheme, computers, interactive whiteboards, hall curtains and donated funds towards the outdoor classroom for the Foundation Unit.

An AGM, to which all parents are invited, is held in the autumn term. At this meeting, those wishing to join the committee can express their interest. The SPA welcomes all parents willing to give of their time and support the school.

How Parents Can Help

We encourage parents/carers to contribute to all aspects of school life. There are many ways in which our parents/carers can help the school including: running the school library, Technology, Cookery, ICT and Computer work, Art, Reading activities, PE and Sport.

Please contact your class teacher if you would like to help in any way (we are always open to new ideas and the school is always seeking ways to improve the provision we offer).

Depending on how often parents/carers come into school to help, you may be asked to complete a DBS (Data Barring Service) check.

Class Parent Representatives

Sarratt Church of England School welcomes volunteers to be class parent representatives. Please express your interest to the class teacher.

Home/School Links

Education is a partnership between the school and home. By starting to promote core values every child develops within the supporting relationship we share. Full details are provided in the Home/School Agreement which sets out the partnership that exists between us.

Parentmail and textservicing are available to communicate with parents. Please ensure that the school office has your correct e-mail address and telephone number. Paper copies can be requested from the school office.

A Brief History of the School

Sarratt Church of England School is situated just off The Green in the thriving village of Sarratt, set in the midst of an area of outstanding natural beauty. The school opened in 1862 in the old flint building in Church Lane just off The Green, now a private house. The new school was built behind the duck pond, next to The Bluebecker Cricketers in 1958, with two classrooms and one office.

The site was developed further in 1969 with the addition of two further classrooms, the central hall and the kitchen. In 1978 an annex was installed in the playground. Originally with a swimming pool, this area was then replaced with the Foundation Unit in 2001, which became operational in 2002 with the opening of the new Reception classroom and the relocation of Sarratt Ducklings Pre-School in the adjoining classroom. During 2002, the annex was refurbished as the "Upper Unit" for the oldest pupils. In April 2006, the "Upper Unit" was demolished and a brick replacement, consisting of two classrooms, was built with a connecting door through the hall.

In 2014, part of the Foundation Unit was given a hard surface and a canopy erected, to provide an all-weather outdoor learning environment. Half of the funds for this venture were raised in the memory of Joyce Newton, who gave over 30 years' service to the school.
